- Aligned with the Foundation's mission
- Single grant awarded annually

## **GLOBAL GRANTS**

- Large, long-term projects
- Sustainable, measurable outcomes
- Alignment with areas of focus
- International partnership
- \$30,000 minimum budget
- World Fund match for DDF



### **AREAS OF FOCUS**

- Peacebuilding and conflict prevention
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water, sanitation, and hygiene
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Community economic development
- \*NEW\* Environment



### SUSTAINABILITY

Sustainability means different things to different organizations.

For Rotary, sustainability means providing long-term solutions to community needs that the beneficiaries can maintain after grant funding ends.



## Start with the community




Identify a need and develop a solution that builds on community strengths and aligns with local values and culture.

## **Encourage local ownership**

Identify key community members who can help pioneer lasting improvements.

## **Provide training**

A project's success depends on people.



## **Buy local**

Purchase equipment and technology from local sources.



## Find local funding

Get local funding through governments, hospitals, companies, and other organizations.

## Measure your success

Develop clear and measurable project outcomes and determine how you will collect your data.



#### **IDENTIFY PROJECT AND PARTNER. HOW?**

- 1. Your contacts in another country
- 2. District leaders and Rotary International Convention
- 3. Rotary Action Groups
- 4. Project Fairs
- 5. Other Rotary Clubs

#### IS THE PROJECT ELIGIBLE FOR A GLOBAL GRANT? HOW DO YOU FIND OUT?

- 1. Review the Areas of Focus Policy Statement and determine which one is applicable.
- 2. Review the Policy Statement guidelines for the applicable Area of Focus.
- 3. Review Terms and Conditions for Rotary Foundation Grants.
- 4. Resolve any uncertainties by contacting District leaders and/or Regional Grants Officer Renee Reiling and possibly the applicable Area of Focus Manager.
- 5. Minimum project \$30,000.
- 6. Conduct a Community Needs Assessment to determine whether the proposed project aligns with the needs of the community as reflected in the assessment.
- 7. Will the project be sustainable?

#### **DEVELOP A BUDGET UTILIZING THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA:**

- 1. Decide on the scope of the project (including Rotarian involvement).
- 2. Work with your co-sponsoring partner club to develop a budget based on the scope of the project (but revise as needed after the Community Needs Assessment).
- 3. Buy local whenever possible.
- 4. Always consider Sustainability as to all budget items.
- 5. Provide in the budget for training (perhaps at least 15%).

#### **DEVELOP A FUNDING BUDGET**

WITH THE FOLLOWING BEING A SAMPLE (NON-US BASED PROJECTS):

Sponsoring U.S. Rotary Club(s) \$ 6	6,000
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U.S. District(s) DDF \$12,000

Other Rotary Clubs (including host club) \$ 4,000

Rotary Foundation World Fund (80% of DDF) \$ 9,600

Total \$31,600


#### DETERMINE HOW YOU WILL MEASURE SUCCESS

- 1. Based on the scope and budget (consistent with the Community Needs Assessment, establish the goals of the project).
- 2. Determine a meaningful way to measure at the end of the project (after the project has been implemented) whether the project has met the goals.

#### WILL THE PROJECT BE SUSTAINABLE?

- Review all the components of the scope, budgeted items and goals to determine whether the goals will continue to be achieved after the grant project has been implemented.
- 2. Who will take on that responsibility?
- 3. What funding source will be available to support that undertaking?
- 4. Are replacement parts, etc. available to maintain components?


## WHAT IS A COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT?

- Examines strengths, weaknesses, needs, assets
- Helps to identify relevant opportunities for projects




### BENEFITS

- Increased understanding of community dynamics
- Helps you make decisions about service priorities
- Builds valuable relationships
- Encourages community member participation
- Helps to build trust, community ownership and sustainability

- Global grant applications now accepted




### ROTARACT PARTICIPATION IN GRANTS

- January 2022: Rotaract clubs may be included in district grant spending plans
- July 2022: Rotaract clubs can apply for global grants
  - Prior experience with global grants
